

Patience Doesn't Come Easy



Plot and Ideas

The narrative attempts to engage the reader with a plausible plot. A description to introduce the conflict is incorporated ("One time my grandmother asked me to help her with her new computer that she didn't know how to use"). The ideas that are introduced attempt to fulfill the demands of the task, but the narrative does not include a clear climax or resolution.



Development and Elaboration

A setting is introduced in this narrative. Characters are introduced, but not clearly developed enough to enhance the story ("In other words, my grandma had no idea how to do anything on the computer"). Some dialogue is included to develop the plot.



Organization and Sequencing

The narrative includes a loose organizational structure with a beginning, middle, and end. It includes some transitions ("One day," "In other words," and "Next"), but they do not enhance the narrative. Some pacing to support the development of the story is attempted.



Language and Style

The narrative begins to give a voice to the characters of grandma and the narrator ("Now about that Facebook page..."). Some descriptive words are used, but more sensory and figurative language would improve the style of the narrative.



Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait 'looks like' in an authentic student essay.
