

Extracurricular Activities



Clarity and Focus

The essay engages the audience and focuses on a central idea that is mostly clear ("An extracurricular activity that is important to me is band. Band is challenging, offers social interaction, and provides exercise"). The writer addresses the demands of the prompt.



Development

The central idea is developed using relevant facts and concrete examples ("The style of marching you will be doing is high step, which to some isn't as hard, but when you have to be doing that for 1 or 2 miles, then it is harder than it looks"). The essay thoughtfully addresses the audience's understanding of the topic by elaborating when necessary.



Organization

The essay uses an organizational structure and appropriate transitions ("to begin with," "Additionally," "Furthermore") to make relevant connections between ideas. An introductory paragraph is present, and the concluding paragraph offers readers a sense of closure ("Participating in extracurricular activities is one of the joys of adolescence").



Language and Style

A formal style is established and maintained, and sentence structure is appropriately varied. Language is generally precise and domain-specific ("social interaction," "competitions," "adolescence") and addresses the complexity of the topic.



Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait 'looks like' in an authentic student essay.
