Expect the Unexpected

The Haunted House



Plot and Ideas

The storyline establishes a plausible context and is built on an exposition that supports the plot ("It all started one Friday at school when my friend Ella asked me if I wanted to go to the haunted house this week"). The writer incorporates sufficient description that builds toward a climax and resolution ("Ultimately, I faced my fear and unexpectedly followed through with the haunted house").



Development and Elaboration

The narrative establishes a clear setting ("All night I thought about the haunted house and how I would be so scared"), while also introducing and developing characters that advance the story and reveal the central idea. There is sufficient dialogue throughout that is mostly effective in enhancing the storyline ("Ella responded 'c'mon Keri, you know you are not busy. Scared maybe, but not busy.").



Organization and Sequencing

A sequence of events is established to show a definite beginning, middle, and end. Pacing is well-utilized and mostly supports the development of the story. The narrative uses transitions and other techniques to signal shifts in time ("all night" and "the next morning") and setting, and the resolution offers closure to the course of events ("Ultimately, I faced my fear").



Language and Style

The narrative uses descriptive words, sensory language, and figurative language to create imagery and convey setting and characters ("my palms were sweaty and my face was getting all red"). The writing is engaging in a way that builds the voices of the characters and the narrator ("The next morning, I woke up and tried to think of some lame excuse to tell Ella").



Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait 'looks like' in an authentic student essay.
