

What is a True Friend?



Plot and Ideas

The narrator introduces a context for the story ("First, it all started when this tall girl named Taylor started to harass me here at school"), which acts as a foundation for the rest of the story. Sufficient description for the conflict is included that builds toward the climax and resolution.



Development and Elaboration

A clear setting (school, bathroom) and developed characters (Molly, Tara, and Taylor) are established. These pieces of the narrative, along with small pieces of descriptive dialogue ("Molly, why are you coming from that way now? Wouldn't it be easier to take the back hallway?") work together to advance the storyline and reveal the central idea ("She is a true friend and is always there when I need her").



Organization and Sequencing

The narrative incorporates transitions ("First," "Over the next few days," and "Just then") to develop a sequence of events that is effectively paced. These transitions and the pacing help to establish an easily understandable beginning, middle, and end for the narrative.



Language and Style

The narrative contains clear sentences and shows some general variety in sentence structure. Descriptive words and sensory language are incorporated to convey the characters and setting of the story ("She didn't listen though and continued to threaten me, backing me up against the wall" and "She ran over to me like a superhero").



Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait 'looks like' in an authentic student essay.
